

Beatles band to sing old-time rock-n-roll April 11 at Relics

Preparing for a "Revolution" has never been easier.

The Beatles, the most well known band in history, created a revolution in 1964 when they first landed in the United States and took rock 'n' roll music by storm. On April 11, Sedona will prepare itself for a new "Revolution" when Ringo McLennonSon Arizona's premier Beatles band, takes the stage at Relics Restaurant and Nightclub.

McLennonSon will make their debut in Sedona at Relics Restaurant and Nightclub, re-creating the music and magic of The Beatles and taking it beyond, with songs made popular by individual members of the band in their solo years.

The band promises to excite audiences with mop top favorites such as "I Saw Her Standing There," "All My Loving" and "Twist and Shout" and follow the Fab Four's journey through "Sgt. Peppers" and "Come Together." McLennonSon grooves through sets of rockers ranging from "Oh! Darling" to "Hey Bulldog" and moves to the familiar favorites of "With a Little Help from My Friends" and "Here Comes the Sun" and then changes the pace with slow dance favorites such as "In My Life" and "Let it Be."

McLennonSon then continues to set the pace and extends the diversity and popularity of The Beatles taking audiences into today as well, with songs made popular by John Lennon, George Harrison and contemporary songs by Paul McCartney and Wings. The four-hour show promises to excite Beatles fans of every age, from college students to Baby Boomers and beyond.

The band features four musicians and two back up singers. Ringo front man Tommy Anderson plays guitar and is the lead singer of the band. He is also a solo artist and fronts Ringo's alter ego, The Tommy Trio, a three-piece band featuring Anderson's original works. Bass player Paul "Pablo" Richards also provides vocals and played with popular reggae band,



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Grant Man and the Island Beat. Drummer Jimbo Gibbons, the "Ringo" of McLennonSon, also provides vocals. Gibbons has been playing Beatles music since he was a kid in South Phoenix. Son of local celeb Sandy Gibbons, Jimbo has played with many local favorites such as Dr. Bombay and The Overtones but has a special fondness for playing with Ringo. A world-class percus-

sionist, Gibbons is featured on Smoot Mahooty's album playing tabla. Steve Golba, the George Martin of the group, rounds out the musicians with masterful keyboards and orchestration.
